Summer Prayers

How have we been praying? What new ways of prayer can we try on? Over the past couple of years, we have grown as church in embracing different ways of prayer in our church. We have our Sunday prayer journal which has been part of our tradition for many years, with prayers for parishioners, our community and our world. We've added to that "Joys and Concerns" as an open time of prayer sharing during worship, and on Communion Sundays, this includes the kids. We have had special rituals of prayer in worship during national or international disasters or tragedies. We Service will start at 9:30 am and be held in the Chapel. It will be a less pray in ordinary time and at sacred moments like baptisms and funerals. Our prayer team prays confidentially for people every week. Our weekly bulletin includes a prayer list we can include in our daily worship. This Spring and Summer, we have opened our committee meetings with scripture and prayer based on theme of discerning God's vision for us. For our summer worship, we include the ritual, prayers of Hopes and Worries, using rocks, a bowl of water and flower petals. Opportunities for prayer are ceaseless.

What can we try next? How can our prayers grow? I'll share a story of how I was pleasantly surprised a few weeks ago about how desiring the general public is of prayer. Victor, Brenda and I were at an all-town meeting and listening session with Rep. Stephen Lynch where people were invited to speak up about their concerns regarding a gas company's pursuit of imposing a compressor on the South Shore against the will of the majority of citizens and legislators. The auditorium was packed at Abigail Adams Middle School. Many impassioned citizens spoke w/ compelling concerns. When it was my turn to speak, I introduced myself and said I go to the site of the proposed compressor and I pray. Sometimes I pray with children of our church. They create "Prayer Walls." I then spoke about the need to protect our children from harm.

What surprised me was the applause that filled the room before I even finished a sentence --when I said two simple words -- "I pray." Wow, are people applauding merely because I pray about this situation? Were they applauding because they know we need prayer and divine intervention? Were they clapping their hands because they are grateful their safety is prayed for? Whatever the answer is, we can be sure of one thing. We have the gift of prayer that we develop from abiding with our Lord Jesus Christ, from worshiping daily with our spiritual prayer practice, and weekly expected to meet with representatives of South Shore Stars, our biggest at church. We can freely share this gift. Not everyone knows how to pray and perhaps some don't even know they're important enough to pray for. Our community needs people of faith to pray with and for them. Here is an excerpt from the book: Faithful Families with an idea for creating some family fun this Summer. "Praver Walk"

When I ask adults in my congregation when they feel the presence of God most clearly, I often hear things such as "while hiking," or "when the sun sets, or "in Nature." So often when we consider the wonders of God, we see evidence of God's creative power in snowfall, or rain, or wind. This practice involves walking in nature and noting the marvels of God's creation.

Designed for ages 5+

- Paper bag, basket, or other container for collecting interesting things
- 2. Magnifying glass
- 3. Binoculars
- 4. Camera
- 5. Sketch pad and pencil or crayons
- Any material that you need on a hike (sunscreen, bug spray, 6. sunglasses, lunch)

- This activity will vary greatly depending on the interests and activities of family members. Consider allowing each family member to pick out the ways that he or she sees God's work. One person might photograph, while another collects things, and yet another sketches.
- Variations:
- Do this prayer walk inside a unique location: a mall, church, etc. Take the same walk and travel the same route over a period of time (one time per month for a year, for example) and compare how observations change over time.
- Travel to a special location for the purpose of this practice. Try different national parks, or other local parks and trails.

Vision Team

Happy Summer everyone! Thank you to all of you who were able to participate in the four Vision Discussions over the past few months. The their faith background, or lack of any faith or church experience, readily Vision Team appreciates you taking the time out of your busy Sundays to participate in this very exciting process.

As you know, things change in our lives, environment, and community that are out of our control. We are going through a visioning process to discover what we want the East Weymouth Congregational Church to be in the future and how to get there.

Here is a quick recap of the topics discussed in the four Vision discussions:

- Reflective History of EWCC, its community and around the World from 1940 to 2019
- EWCC Community An Executive Insite Report was reviewed that used a 3-mile radius around the Church and highlighted 12 insites of the demographics of the neighborhoods including the ethnicities, ages, income levels, education, and employment. Also MOSAIC Segments were reviewed. Incredibly, the estimated 2018 population within the 3-mile radius is almost 69,000!!
- Development of a Purpose Statement Why do we exist as a 3) Church and what is our impact to be?
- An exercise to determine "What are our core values?" This was an exercise to determine the top three values that drive the EWCC ministry. Both "current" and "aspirational" values were discussed.

The following represents the top three core values of EWCC from Bettyanne Lang the worksheets submitted.

- We value treating all people with kindness and respect through our Michelle Young words, actions and deeds.
- We value reaching with abundant welcome those who may not know us and what we can offer.

We value worship that makes us want to be here; preaching, teaching, singing and prayer that inspires hope and renewal.

The next discussion to take place will be to develop a Vision Statement for EWCC; a "picture" of our future in the next 3-5 years as we live out our newly formed values and purpose.

This fifth Vision Church Discussion will take place on Sunday, July 21st in place of a worship service so that everyone can participate. We want you all to be part of this process because our future depends on it. Please plan to

Our Coach Rev. Paul Nickerson sends our Pastor and Vitality Team articles every week about church vitality. Here's a recent article great for our church to ponder over and find our own ways to put into action:

If you have been reading this newsletter fairly regularly, you know that a key in reaching new people is to be out in the community meeting people and building relationships. These connections lead to hearing people's stories and having opportunities to share our journey as well.

As you build these new relationships, and hear the life situations of others, I want to encourage you to ask people the following question: "Can I pray for you?"

Or, "How might I best pray for you?"

When we ask such questions, we are offering one of the most incredible things a church has to give to the community: the power of corporate prayer for someone's life situation. We are inviting someone we have come to know the opportunity to have their joys and concerns lifted up to God by a group of faithful people. As one author said, "I don't know how intercessory prayer works, but I know what it feels like when people are praying for me".
